Why did you join?

I did not come to Tech with my mind made up about rushing. I met some Brothers — Rob Craig '86 and Eric Fawcett '87 — during FASET and I made it a point to find them at Kappa Sigma during rush. I felt Kappa Sigma was more of a 'real' group of guys than most of the other fraternities.

Tell us about your favorite memory of the fraternity.

On Friday afternoons in the late '80s, we would put our huge speakers on the roof and crank up Led Zeppelin, Van Halen, Boston, or other high-energy rock and roll. When walking home from class, you could hear the music well before you got back to the house — it almost made you run the rest of the way home. We would hang out in the lobby, drink, and just joke or laugh. Sometimes the lobby furniture was out on the grass and we would hang out there. In general, my favorite memories are just hanging out with the guys, mostly in the lobby, and just laughing our butts off about whatever the topic was. I'll also never forget wars with the Fijis, Luaus, and Black and White formals.

Did you live in the house? If so, who were your roommates? Tell us about a memorable time with them.

I lived in the house for three years. My roommates were Pat Hunter '87, Tom

Potosnak '88, Mark Ramberger '88, and Alan Seidemann '90. Most of my memories of those times probably wouldn't come across correctly 15 years later. ;-)

What is your nickname, if applicable, and how did you get it?

Sponge. I got it while I was a pledge because I would 'soak up' certain beverages. I was doing something during lunch and one of the Brothers said "Mike get a sponge" and someone else said "Sponge!" and then it stuck. I dressed up as a sponge for my freshman Halloween party. Later some things happened at parties where I acted like a sponge but those came after the nickname.

With whom do you still stay in contact? Who would you most like to find?

I stay in regular contact with Jimmy Fortuna '91 (with whom I have worked for many years), Derik Davis '90, and Robb Stanek '90. There are many others in the Atlanta area I see often. It would be interesting to hear from some of the guys in my pledge class who moved away, like Eric Reitler '89 and Jim McLaughlin '90.

What other activities or organizations were you involved with during your college days?

I was pretty busy — I was IFC treasurer and then president, and a teachers assistant for physics and calculus. I also ran a computer lab in the EE department. I refereed intramurals. During my senior year, I was the head referee and booked all the games.

What kind of influence has the fraternity had on your life since graduation?

I am absolutely convinced that the experience of being GT and GM of the fraternity gave me a big head start in the business world in learning how to deal

with people and be a leader. My friends from the chapter also have been involved with my jobs.

Tell us about your family: Have you married? Do you have children?

I have been married for almost ten years and have three boys — ages 7, 4, and 2. We live in South Forsyth County, north of Atlanta.



What do you do for a living?

I have been a hardware/software design engineer for most of my years since graduation. I helped build Radiant Systems, a startup

company, into a successful business where I was running a 25-person engineering group. Recently, I went out on my own and have my own business as an independent contractor. I am staying busy.

What affiliations do you currently have and/or public service do you participate in?

I have refereed high school basketball in the Atlanta area for 12 years. That is one of my favorite distractions. I also have been the treasurer of the House Corporation for ten years.

Lady Alexis of Alpha Tau, Kappa Sigma

Records indicate that the Brothers of Alpha Tau have been caring for dogs since the early '50s. At that time, Alpha Taus called 707 Williams Street home and their first dog was Caduceus. In 1963, Bleu became Alpha Tau's best friend, and he witnessed many a good time during his day. Samantha, then Lady followed Bleu's tour of duty. Apparently, Lady became quite a campus celebrity and attended more hours of class than some brothers.

More than a decade in a fraternity house can take its toll on even the hardest stock of canine. As Lady's health deteriorated, Alpha Tau debated getting a new dog. A motion passed in May 1994



stated, "Be it enacted by the Alpha Tau chapter of Kappa Sigma that... We buy a new dog, as long as Lady stays, for a price approved by the chapter." In early 1995, the brothers acquired a black and tan German Shepherd

named Jackie Daniels. Unfortunately, a few weeks later, Jackie Daniels found his way into some rat poison near the kitchen and died. A few weeks after the pup's death, a few brothers picked up a tiny, white German Shepherd that was named Alex. At the end of the school year, Lady's health demanded that she leave fraternity life. The parents of Brothers **Michael and John Pouncey** took Lady to live her remaining days comfortably on their farm.

Alex—AKC-registered as Lady Alexis of Alpha Tau of Kappa Sigma—quickly became a campus celebrity. Most of the campus knew that the now big, white shepherd belonged to the fraternity with the big white rock (the house was now located on Fowler Street). Some professors even had the honor of Alex attending their lectures, although some protested.

Alex was a true guardian of the house. The pledge class of fall 1996 thought it would be a good idea to have a pledge raid at 6 a.m. In their attempt to secure the interior doors shut with ropes and chains, Alex awoke Brother Bill Bivens, who thwarted the pledge raid with a baseball bat and a vow to depledge every pledge there. Many would-be thieves also left the premises empty-handed because of Alex's intimidation.

Unfortunately, Alex has always had health problems. Some serious gastrointestinal problems developed as a result of being fed table scraps and rummaging through garbage, which always seemed to be easily accessible. As she grew older, her hangovers lasted longer and her patience for late-night parties waned. In

May of 2001, the Brothers agreed to let Alex graduate and retire after her brief six-year tenure. Lately, Alex has been suffering from poor coordination in her rear legs. After many tests at the UGA Veterinary School, Alex has been diagnosed with Degenerative Myelopathy, a condition similar to Multiple Sclerosis in humans. There is no cure for Degenerative Myelopathy and no clinically-proven treatments. The use of her rear legs will continue to deteriorate over the next several months, and she will likely have to be euthanized within a year or so.

It saddens me and many brothers to know of Alex's impending fate. But we take solace in the many good times we shared with Alex. From pledge retreats to intramurals; from rush to graduation; from keep-away in the yard to barking in a professor's class... Alex has been a loyal and honorable mascot of Alpha Tau.

Today, Alpha Tau has a black and tan German Shepherd named Rocco. While not quite full grown, he already promises to fulfill the legacy of his predecessors as a campus celebrity and best friend to many Brothers.

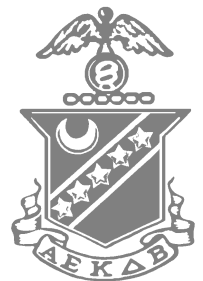
What hobbies do you enjoy?
