The past six months have been a busy and important time for the House Corporation. At the October 30 meeting, the board unanimously approved a new slate of officers. I am the new president, and I am committed to trying to fill the enormous shoes of **Geoff Gill** '64, the outgoing president. Geoff has been the heart and soul of the House Corp. for 25 years. He led the effort to bring the House Corp. and chapter into excellent health in the '80s and championed the fundraiser and 2nd story buildout in the '90s. We cannot thank Geoff enough for his service to our fraternity, and we are grateful that he is staying active with the board.

The new board will meet this spring to develop a strategic long range plan for the House Corporation and the house itself. We will establish priorities for ourselves, focusing on the areas we feel are most important for the long-term stability of the fraternity. This meeting will be held **Sunday May 7** at 4pm at the house. All alumni are invited to attend. We feel it important to set aside some time to think long range instead of battle the endless tactical pains that come with being a landlord. After the meeting, we will publish our results for alumni review and comment.

One element for a long range plan will obviously be the timing of a tear-down and rebuild of the house. In the past 10 years, a majority of the fraternities on the Tech campus have built new and impressive houses. With every one that goes up, the relative strength of our property goes down. To remain competitive in the long term, our 50-year-old facility needs to be replaced. No target date has been set, but there is agreement starting construction within 5-10 years is a reasonable goal.

There are a myriad of challenges ahead of the House Corp. related to a new build. Our lot is small for the facility size needed, and may be inadequate. Houses built on campus in the past 5 years cost from \$2 million to \$3 million dollars. Obviously an enormous fundraiser must be undertaken. We will give all of this a great deal of consideration as we develop a timeline for the house over the next several years.

The House Corporation celebrates the receipt of a substantial donation from Ms. Dolores Reinch of Virginia. Ms. Reinch's sonin-law is **Al Pierce**, a 1958 alum and board member. Her grandson is **Gerald Pierce**, a current undergrad member of Alpha Tau.

The new board will meet this spring to develop a strategic long range plan for the House Corporation and the house itself. We will establish priorities for ourselves, focusing on the areas we feel are most important for the long-term stability of the fraternity.

This kind donation will serve as a significant jump start on a capital campaign for the future. We also greatly appreciate the large number of alums who give yearly to our annual fund.
