

ALUMNI PROFILE

There's No Place like Home, Unless Your Yellow Brick Road Leads to the Kappa Sigma House

The Brotherhood and Camaraderie of the Brothers of Kappa Sigma Gave Bill Wren '46 Valuable Memories

Bill Wren '46 grew up Wrens, Georgia, and making the transition from a small town to the community at Georgia Tech was a little overwhelming. "Wrens had a population of about 2,000 people. Everybody looked after everybody. When I came to Georgia Tech, nobody looked after anybody. The fraternity was a lifesaver."

His father, **William Wren Sr. '16**, was also a Kappa Sigma at Georgia Tech, and Bill applied because he wanted an education in technology. The war's effect was very noticeable on campus. "Fifty percent of the tech student body was in the reserves," he remembers.

Bill lived in the fraternity house for nine months before he joined the Navy reserves. His roommate at the house, **Kirk McKay**

'49, was a very memorable character. "When he wanted you to turn out the lights at night, he'd take out the light bulbs and break them," Bill chuckles. "He had whiskey on his cereal for breakfast, and when he was drunk [at night], he'd ask you to hit him against the chin so he'd fall asleep."

One of Bill's favorite memories of Kappa Sigma was speaking to rushees during pledge week. "It gave us a chance to talk to freshman about our feelings about the fraternity. When you have to put your feelings into words, they begin to mean more to you."

His dedication was solidified when he served as treasurer for Kappa Sigma. "It wasn't an easy task because they didn't have any money," he says. "I had to be in charge of rent, making people pay their dues and managing the finances of the chapter." During Bill's senior year, the brothers agreed to buy ceramic cream-colored beer mugs with Kappa Sigma on the front and each brother's name on the back of his own mug. Bill wanted "Billy" on the back of his, but some of the brothers played a trick on him. "When I got it, it didn't say Billy, it said 'Shylock," Bill admonishes. Shylock is the name of a money-lender from Shakespeare's play, The Merchant of Venice, who famously asks one of his borrowers for a "pound of flesh."

"That was what they thought of my treasurer's abilities," Bill laughs. "The way I interpreted it was that I was effective."

It was through Kirk that Bill met his wife, Nancy. Kirk's girlfriend made the introduction. "We talked on the phone, and

bingo, that was it. We got engaged when I graduated. We celebrated our 60th wedding anniversary this past September, and we're still speaking," Bill says. He and Nancy have four daughters, six grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.

Bill worked for Carrier Air Conditioning Company for seven years in the Southeast, then spent three years working for Sig Cox in Augusta, Georgia. He eventually returned to Carrier and worked in their Syracuse office for 27 years. He retired early from Carrier to care for Nancy when her health declined, and came home and worked at a friend's furniture store for 10-15 years before officially retiring in 2001.

Bill's favorite hobbies were golfing, fishing, woodworking and ship model building. Now he keeps busy participating in weekly senior exercise programs, caring for his handicapped wife and spending time with his family.

Though not as involved as he used to be, Bill is very much in support of Kappa Sigma. "You need a home away from home when you're in a big college, and the only place you're going to get that is a fraternity. For me, it was Kappa Sigma," he says. "I wouldn't have made it through Georgia Tech without it."
