Kappa Sig's Wreck Wins #1 in Contraption & Display Categories


Homecoming weekend was a tremendous success for Kappa Sigma alums and undergrads.



The Story of the 1964 Kappa Sigma IM Football Champions

Thanks to Mac Anderson for submitting this great story and picture from his Kappa Sigma days.

Kappa Sigma completed an undefeated season by winning the 1964 intramural championship in a 33 to 0 romp over Techwood Dorm, the independent league champion.



Kappa Sigma's biggest test came in the fraternity league playoffs. Their game against Alpha Tau Omega, the league runner-up, ended in a scoreless tie. Kappa Sigma won the championship with a

penetration that came on a short pass from Mac Anderson to John Rowley in the right flat. John had seen an opening and suggested the play in the huddle.

Kappa Sigma's 1964 success was built on a solid defense, and on an offense that relied heavily on Mac Anderson's passes to outstanding receiver, Scotty McCoy, who scored 12 touchdowns. The offense also depended on Billy Toney's excellent field goal kicking, and Mac's running behind the outstanding blocks of a tough offensive line and of blocking backs Tommy Moore and John Rowley. This picture includes the core members

of the Kappa Sigma's 1964 championship team. A number of this core group played both offense and defense.

TRIBUTE

Paying Tribute to a Brother Nearly 50 Years after His Death By Mike Dudgeon '89

It's amazing the bonds that our brotherhood holds – especially 50 years after graduation. This story is especially touching, as it shows how Kappa Sigmas really do honor and tribute each other in both life and death.

As part of a 50-year reunion, Alpha Tau of Kappa Sigma members from the year 1959 got together at the chapter house over Homecoming to honor one of their own, Tommy Smith. Tommy was the GM in 1959 and died in a Naval aviation accident in 1961. Lieutenant Smith received the Distinguished Flying Cross for heroic action as he stayed at the controls of his crippled jet as he flew over

a densely populated area of Japan. He did not eject so he could prevent loss of civilian lives.

Brothers Armand Breard '59 and Bill Goodhew helped organize the tribute, which included a copy of his citation which was presented to the undergrad chapter. Those present at the ceremony shared stories about Brother Smith, saying he was an "all-American guy", "smart and athletic", and "the kind of man you wanted your kids to grow up to be."

The citation and picture of Brother Smith and his medals are now on permanent display in the chapter hall.

The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS posthumously to Lieutenant, Junior Grade, Thomas L. Smith Jr., United States Navy for the service as set forth in the following.

"For heroic conduct in aerial flight as Pilot of a Jet Aircraft in Attack Squadron ONE HUNDRED NINETY FIVE, attached to the USS BON HOMME RICHARD (CVA-31), during routine flight operations from the Naval Air Station, Atsugi, Japan on 27 November 1961. Experience a partial power failure while in the process of landing his aircraft, Lieutenant, Junior Grade, Smith elected to remain in his disabled craft long enough to avoid several populated areas, thereby materially reducing his chances for a safe

ejection. His selfless and decisive action to protect the lives and property of innocent civilians, resulting in the sacrifice of his own life, reflects the highest credit upon Lieutenant, Junior Grade, Smith and the United States Naval Service."
